the claims of her own young family and of philanthropic work for the benefit of babies and children absorbed her time and

capabilities.

Sad to say, her gracious and beautiful life was not to be a long one. To the deep sorrow of her loved ones and friends, on August 21, 1931, her noble spirit winged its flight to other spheres, leaving ineffaceable memories of lovableness, constancy, valour, forgetfulness of self, and breadth of understanding.

Dorothy Morton entered College in November, 1918, being the 221st on the entrance roll, and left College at the end of 1919, having gained the Diploma in Massage with Distinction. After leaving College she was appointed Resident Masseuse at the Royal Prince Alfred Hospital, but left during the course of 1920 to take up practice in Macquarie Street.

She left behind her at her death two young sons, aged about

six and five years, Anthony and David.

Mabel Murray-Prior. Obiit Jan. 9, 1932, Dublin.

Mabel Murray-Prior came up to College in 1899, being the 41st student to enter. She left after passing her first year of Arts, with 2nd class Honours in French. She returned to College in 1903 to study Medicine, and left again after passing the 3rd yeard of Medicine, in March, 1907, returning again for the Michaelmas Term of 1911.

Miss Murray-Prior graduated M.B. in Dublin.

D.K.M.-P. writes of her: "Mabel worked at one of the London hospitals during the war. It must have been about 1921 that she returned to Australia for a visit. After that she travelled for some years before settling down to country life in England and in Ireland. She was a keen sportswoman and took great pleasure in hunting and in breeding dogs. In 1931 she was taking a course in gynæcology in Dublin. We saw her in Ireland before we left for Australia. She was then in poor health after a bad fall. Subsequently pneumonia set in and although news was cabled that she was recovering, there was a sudden relapse. She died in hospital. She was a brave, vivacious and warm-hearted woman, and we have found very many friends who mourn her passing."

Her life in London is filled with various activities, among the more recent being the movement for building a new Hall of Residence for the Women Students of University College. This period embraces a year of study in London and of travel on the Continent of Europe, a year's temporary educational post in Hyderabad, India, educational work in Tanganyika Territory, East Africa, and at Ispahan, Persia.

While in Sydney Miss Anderson is giving voluntary

assistance to the Church Missionary Society.

Miss Anderson's niece is the present Senior Student of the

College.

Eula Boazman is expected back in New South Wales in June, after several years' absence, during which she obtained her diploma after a two years course at the House of Education, Scale How, Ambleside, in the Lake District of England. She has since taught for four terms. Her training was in the Charlotte Mason Method advocated by the Parents' National Educational Union.

Sylvia Bray has been appointed by the University Senate to be Radium Registrar at the Sydney Hospital, and went as delegate from the Sydney Hospital to the Annual Cancer Con-

ference held at Canberra in March.

Enid Carpenter has been Tutor in Psychology at the Women's College since her graduation, while holding a Science Research Scholarship in Psychology. This year she was appointed by the Senate of the University Demonstrator in Psychology and Honorary Carillonist. Miss Carpenter has since been elected to the Wentworth Travelling Fellowship, and proposes first to study in London and later to take the two years course of training at the Malines School of Carillon Playing, Belgium.
