Dear Sir.

In reference to your  
Memo asking for particulars  
concerning my brother, Dr. F. L.  
Wall - I have much pleasure  
in forwarding you the following:-  
Captain Wall left Adelaide  
for the front on June 14<sup>th</sup> 1915. on  
arrival in Egypt was placed  
on the staff of No. 1 Australian  
General Hospital, Heliopolis.  
At the beginning of August was  
sent to Gallipoli, where he

<sup>2</sup>  
was placed in charge of an Advanced  
Dressing Station in charge of the  
3<sup>rd</sup> Field Ambulance. Here, he  
unfortunately contracted typhoid  
fever & was sent back to Egypt  
(September 2<sup>nd</sup>). Was ill in  
No. 2 General Hospital Alexandria  
for two weeks, was sent on to a  
Convalescent Hospital for a few  
days, after which he went on  
medical duty at Carlton  
Camp for a week. Sailed for  
Gallipoli again on October 7<sup>th</sup>.  
Upon arrival at Gallipoli  
was placed in charge of the  
Anzac Beach Camp Dug-out  
Hospital for a few weeks. Then was

made R. No. 10 to VI Battalion  
(Victorian). Was in the evacuation  
& sent on to Lemnos until middle  
of January, when his Battalion was  
sent on to Egypt, camped there  
at Tel-el-Kehir for a few days &  
then moved on into the desert.  
Sailed at the end of March with  
Battalion for France & still with  
VI Battalion in trenches there.  
Has been with this Battalion  
in both Poziere & Trunets.  
Captain Wall writes in most  
enthusiastic terms of the  
wonderful bravery and devotion  
to duty of the stretcher bearers.  
Several in his Battalion have  
been decorated for conspicuous

bravery.
