First World War nurse, Sister Greta Norman Towner became a qualified nurse when the profession was in its infancy. These objects speak to Greta Towner and her family links with nursing.

Built by the Benevolent Society in 1889 the first building was a 30-bed hospital for children. Situated on the corner of Agnes and Denham Streets opposite the Girls' Grammar School. Administered by a joint committee of the Society and the Rockhampton Hospital.

Extensions were added over the years to accommodate 62 children in 5 wards. In 1928, the children were relocated to a new ward at the General Hospital. The remaining buildings were relocated to the General Hospital and used as Nurses Quarters.



Note the nurse third from the right in the second row is named as C Towner. Investigation of hospital archives by Ashley Reid identify her as Christianna Margaret Towner, one of Greta Norman Towner's younger sisters. Queensland State Archives also list Clara Towner as a registered nurse in Brisbane in 1922 and 1923.

A third sister, Carrie Towner in family history is remembered as a bush nurse and having seven daughters, five of whom became nurses with the tradition of nursing continuing down to her granddaughter and great granddaughter today.

Sister Greta Towner is nursing in 1919 after returning from the First World War though not in a children's hospital but with a Red Cross Convalescent Home, Abbotsford, Sydney, Australia. This the beginning of her long career of working with veterans.
