Miss Montefiore, Administrator, Women's Auxiliary Army Corps.

Isabel Ormiston, M.B., work in Belgium, Serbia, Montenegro. Decorated with Order of Leopold of Belgium for services to the wounded.

Elsie Dalyell, M.B., Servia, with Lady Wimbourne's Unit, later Salonika and Constantinople. First woman to be given her own laboratory with the armies out there.

Enid Armstrong, sent to England as V.A.D. by Australian Red Cross. Mentioned in despatches for valuable nursing services, Leicester Military Hospital.

Dr. Marjory Little was first woman attached to the R.A.M.C. to be sent to France and to be given charge of a laboratory there.

Millicent Armstrong, first orderly, then secretary at Scottish Women's Hospital at Royaumont. Awarded Croix-de-Guerre for bravery and devotion to duty during bombardment.

A. Laurie Ingram (née Edwards). Drove Y.M.C.A. car in London, and later second in authority, R.A.M.C. Paris.

E. E. Bourne, M.B., Endell-street, London, and later R.A.M.C. Headquarters, York, England.

Leila Hamilton Brown, M.B., Endell-street Hospital for Wounded; afterwards in Egypt.

Marion Simpson (née Windeyer), V.A.D. and work on land.

Lois Windeyer, V.A.D. and work on land.

Myril Bowman and Roslyn Rutherford, masseuses first in English Hospital for Wounded, and then in France.

Lucy Reynolds (née Adams), land worker.

Dr. Emma Buckley, medical war work in England; later sent out as medical officer in charge of women and children on the transport "Osterley."

Mabel Murray Prior, M.B., medical war work, England.

Dr. Grace Cordingley, M.B., medical war work, England.
