


Figure 2 - Northern Suburbs Musical Society Concert program - 20 September 2009

R BEAN Recounts the action of the 9Div advance to the starting line to commence the dawn attack at Passchendaele I on 12/10/17, through the German gas barrage called 'Moondnacht', in pouring rain and pitch darkness, only to find the line was not secured. Captains Gilder and Jeffries, commanding the leading companies of the 34Bn, halted their companies "at the entrance to the Broodseinde railway cutting, and themselves went forward to make sure that their column might not run into the enemy." [IV 910ff] R BEAN mentions the action later in the day for which Capt Gilder won his MC [IV 913]

R BEAN also recounts the action before Villers-Bretonneux, on 30/3/18, which attempted to secure the spur at Aubercourt. Captain Gilder's company was asked to reinforce the left of the 34Bn line. "Captain Gilder found by personal reconnaissance that the German line there lay along the crest. At 8 o'clock, advancing silently in one line followed by a machine-qun of the 9th Company, his men drove the Germans out of their picquet-line, capturing two machine-guns, and then swept on and cleared them from their main line, a continuous trench....Gilder decided to occupy the trench, and sent out patrols to find touch with the 33rd on his right. After a long search a patrol of the 33rd was met. R Its leader, Lieutenant King [Robert Cecil King qv. This was during the action for which King won his MC. The 33Bn had lost, earlier the same day, Lieut JGA Pockley, qv.], indicated where the line on the right lay, and said that it was hopeless for it to attempt a junction with Gilder's company. Gilder accordingly withdrew to the 33rd's line, 250 yards in rear, hjis troops filling a wide gap. Another gap was filled by two more companies of the 34th, and its last company was brought up into close reserve. Rain was still falling. Rifles and Lewis guns were difficult to clean. Maps became pulped and useless. But the troops were in high spirits. Ammunition and supplies were brought in limbers to the wood, and on pack animals to the advanced positions. The Germans driven back by Gilder's company did not detect his withdrawal, and the trench on the crest remained empty until 1.30 next morning, when a line of men appeared on the sky-line there. Intense fire was opened on them, and the figures vanished." [V 307-308] MC: "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On the 12 Octr 1917 near PASSCHENDAELE he led his Coy forward with great coolness and bravery. Personalising the ANZAC Story

ANZAC Day. A day that was first celebrated in 1916 to commemorate the sacrifices of Australian soldiers at Gallipoli, yet has come to honour all Australians who have died in battle.

Yet the problem with the ANZAC legend, in my mind, is that it may lack relevance to Australians in years to come. While 2015, the 100th Anniversary of the Gallipoli landings, is rightfully significant on the Australian calendar, is this the pinnacle of the celebration of ANZAC Day? How could the bicentenary, or the tercentenary, possibly be more important than this year?

The solution to this problem is to keep ANZAC Day relevant to generations of young Australians, so that the memory of those who fought in the First World War and beyond is not forgotten. And the way to do this is to personalise the ANZAC story, to find examples of courage and hardship and sacrifice that young Australians can relate to, and thus rediscover the experiences of soldiers not much older than themselves.

In my case, I read about my great-grandfather,

Captain Telford Graham Gilder. He fought in 'the Great War', and as a former Shore boy, his story is relevant to many of the readers of the SWR.

Gilder attended Shore between 1908 and 1913 – he was a Prefect, a member of the 2nd XI (cricket), played the violin and was a corporal in cadets. After leaving, he enlisted in the Australian Army in November 1916, joining the 34th Battalion, and reached France a year later.

While serving, Gilder fought in the Battle of Passchendaele, and won the Military Cross, "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty." The citation reads as follows:

On 12th Octr. 1917 near PASSCHENDALE he led his Coy. forward with great coolness and bravery. When finding his left flank was open to enfilade machine gun fire he promptly made a personal reconnaissance of the open flank, and in spite of being blown up on two occasions by shells succeeded in organising a party and closing the exposed flank. Through he showed a fine example of leadership and courage under extremely heavy fire.

For me, the ANZAC legend now becomes more than a vaguely defined concept of courage and sacrifice. It now has a face, and regardless of whether you have a relative who fought in the First World War, or any war since, there are countless other Australian stories no more or less poignant than this one.

Students of Shore are lucky in the sense that the school spares no effort to remember our soldiers. Polished Pennies and the War Memorial Playing Fields are tangible reminders of Shore's contribution to the ANZAC legend.

And if everyone can attach a face, or a story, to ANZAC Day, then our soldiers' sacrifice will never be forgotten.




Figure 15 – Letter to W A Gilder notifying hospital admission of T G Gilder, Source: Harrower collection

The Nominal Roll of Australian Imperial Force who left Australia for service abroad, 1914-1918 War is a single alphabetic listing of approximately 324,000 names of members of the AIF who served overseas during WW I. The roll was compiled before October 1919, probably at AIF Administrative Headquarters, London. It is believed that the roll was compiled to assist with the administrative arrangements necessary to repatriate members of the AIF to Australia.

The entries in the roll record include:

- Service number (Officers and nursing sisters were not allocated service numbers)
- Final rank
- Surname, first name (including some but not all honours)
- Unit of service at the time of death or at the end of the war
- Date of enlistment
- Non-effective entry (i.e. how that person became no longer effective, for example Returned to Australia)
- Date of death or start date of non-effect

34th Battalion History

Telford Graham Gilder enlisted with B Company 34th Battalion AIF on the 6 January 1916 with the rank of 2nd Lieutenant and was an original member of the Battalion.

Until the 10 March 1916, early training and formation of the Battalion was in progress. On that day the Battalion marched to the newly pitched camp at Rutherford and was completed with the exception of Transport. These joined later and came from the Army Service Corps camp near Sydney. Here strenuous training was carried out. The men were very keen and fit, whilst their comfort and health were made a special study. Food was good and ample and sports and recreation were not overlooked.

A Girl's League was formed to cater for the comforts of the Battalion, under the supervision of Miss Violet Mackay, who took a keen interest from the beginning, having, with the Mayor of Maitland met the men of the Wallaby March at East Greta and prepared dinner for them on their arrival. On 1 May 1916, the Battalion left by train from Farley Station for the Showground in Sydney, equipped with kit bags and necessary clothing, and was reviewed in Moore Park by General Ramaccotti. On the following morning, 2 May 1916 the men embarked on the transport HMAT A20 "HORORATA" and sailed at 4:00pm

The voyage to England was without any unusual incidents and a good passage throughout. The first port of call was Albany, where three days were spent. Colombo was reached on Empire Day, 24 May 1916. Here two days were taken up coaling and taking on provisions, etc. During the stay the Battalion carried out a route march through the town. Suez was reached on 8 June 1916, where a party of Light Horse and some details were disembarked. Arriving at Port Said on 9 June 1916, the ship coaled and proceeded to Alexandria which was reached on 11 June 1916.




Figure 18 - SS Aragon, Source: http://www.merchantnavyofficers.com/rm2.html

Here the Battalion transferred to S.S."Aragon", E867. Some Australian Details were on board, also a number of Tommies going to England on Furlough. Devonport was reached on the 23 June 1916, the Battalion disembarked at Plymouth at 1:00pm and entrained during the afternoon for Amesbury, arriving at midnight and marching to hutments at No: 1 Camp, Larkhill. Here the Battalion settled down to hard training, which included Route Marching, Trench Digging, Bomb Practice, Musketry and general Camp Routine. Later the Battalion moved to the No. 25 Camp and finished off their training, which included six days' battle practice and field work at the Bustard Trenches.

Four days' disembarkation leave was given from 6-10 July 1916 and later King's Leave from 5-9 November 1916. Whilst here, the Official Colours were issued. Purple over Green (Oval), these replacing the Colours presented to the Battalion (Old Gold on Shoulder Straps) by the Ladies of West Maitland. A Signal Section was formed at Larkhill under Lieutenant Harold Henry McMinn. The weather in England was mostly fine until the latter part of training, when a good deal of rain and snow caused inconvenience. In October 1916 the 34th Battalion was reviewed at a Divisional Parade by His Majesty King George V at Bulford.

The 34th Battalion left Larkhill on the 21 November 1916 and entrained at Amesbury for Southampton, embarking on the S.S "Arundel". The transport section left by S.S. "Princess Victoria". The Battalion arrived at Le Harve, France on the 22 November 1916. Disembarkation commenced at 8:00am and the Battalion marched to No. 1 camp on the Hill, arriving at 2:00pm. The men carried heavy loads, in some cases amounting to miniature Q.M.' Stores. The march over cobblestones was very tiring, notwithstanding the many route marches which had been carried out at Larkhill. However, after bathing their feet and receiving treatment, as well partaking of a good meal, some spent a comfortable night.




Figure 20 SS Arundel, Source: http://catnaps.org/bulle/intro.html

The following morning the Battalion moved to Le Harve Railway Station, leaving D Company behind. On arrival at the station entraining commenced at 8:00am and the train left at 11:15am. The journey was slow and occupied until 4:30pm on the 24 November 1916. On arrival at Bailleul the men detrained and marched to Outtersteene. D Company arrived at 4:00pm the following day. The Battalion rested here in billets for two days previous to taking over garrison duties in the Line at Armenties. The Commanding Officer Lieutenant Colonel Malcolm St John Lamb with the Adjutant, Company commanders, N.C.O's and Specialists went into the Line to inspect Trenches, Stores, Plans and to arrange for the taking over this Section of the line on the following day.

Official History of Australia in the War of 1914-1918

12 October 1917

Charles Bean recounts the action of the 9th Division advance to the starting line to commence the dawn attack at Passchendaele I on 12 October 1917, through the German gas barrage called 'Moondnacht', in pouring rain and pitch darkness, only to find the line was not secured.

12 Oct 1917 PASSCHENDAELE II [Volume IV page 910]

At 1.30 a.m. rain showers began. By 2.30 it was raining lightly but steadily, by 3.30 fairly heavily. The infantry moved on through the pitchy dark in single file. In some battalions each man held on to the equipment of the man ahead of him; if touch was broken, those in front had to come back. The news that the line as reported by the 66th Division was not held had only just reached the incoming troops. Accordingly, in the right brigade (9th) the leading company commanders (Captains Jeffries and Gilder of the 34th) stopped their men at the entrance to the Broodseinde railway cutting, and themselves went on to make sure that their column might not run into the enemy. At Keerselaarhoek cemetery they found the tape duly laid, and met the officer of the 36th Battalion who had laid it, and by 3 o'clock, the time set, the 34th was extended on its jumping-off position. But during the previous halt and afterwards, as it lay on the tape, the battalion was persistently shelled and suffered many casualties. The 10th Brigade completed its assembly by 3.20, the 37th, 38th, and 40th lying in that order from front to rear, The men pulled their waterproof sheets over their heads for shelter against the rain, and slept. But they, too, were severely shelled and suffered considerable loss.

Note: Captain Jeffries was awarded a posthumous Victoria Cross for his actions on this day.




Figure 22 Situation map, approx. British front line from information received up to 6 p.m. 26.10.17

12 Oct 1917 PASSCHENDAELE II [Volume IV page 913]

Part of the line was also held up by a pillbox close to the Passchendaele road near the highest point of the ridge. Here there was practically no shelter for the attack, but Captain Jeffries of the 34th managed to organise a party, with Sergeant Bruce26 and another N.C.O., and a dozen men, and, outflanking it, charged the place from the rear, capturing 25 Germans and 2 machine-guns These actions set free the advance. The pillbox captured by Jeffries being not far short of the first objective, the 34th dug in there. Great loss had been incurred; the 34th had only three officers then left and there were wide gaps in the line. The right flank had swung far away from the railway, along which the 4th Division was attacking; but on the left Captain Gilder (34th) found the 10th Brigade digging in slightly to his left rear under Captain Latchford (38th), and fell back seventy yards to join it.

30 March 1918

R BEAN also recounts the action before Villers-Bretonneux, on 30 March 1918, which attempted to secure the spur at Aubercourt. Captain Gilder's company was asked to reinforce the left of the 34th Battalion line.

Morshead's first task after the attack had been to establish his line more firmly. In consequence of the furious shelling of the wood, the reserves and his headquarters had been unable to take up the positions planned for them, and had moved to the comparative quiet of the open fields nearby. Casualties having been heavy upon the right, and a wide gap existing there, Morshead at 7 o'clock sent thither his reserve company. At the same time he asked the 34th to send a company to reinforce the left. The commander of this company, Captain Gilder found by personal reconnaissance that the German line there lay along the crest. At 8 o'clock, advancing silently in one line followed by a machine-gun of the 9th Company, his men drove the Germans out of their picquet-line, capturing two machine-guns, and then swept on and cleared them from their main line, a continuous trench....Gilder decided to occupy the trench, and sent out patrols to find touch with the 33rd Battalion on his right. After a long search a patrol of the 33rd Battalion was met. Its leader, Lieutenant King, indicated where the line on the right lay, and said that it was hopeless for it to attempt a junction with Gilder's company. Gilder accordingly withdrew to the 33rd Battalion's line, 250 yards in rear, his troops filling a wide gap. Another gap was filled by two more companies of the 34th Battalion, and its last company was brought up into close reserve. Rain was still falling. Rifles and Lewis guns were difficult to clean. Maps became pulped and useless. But the troops were in high spirits. Ammunition and supplies were brought in limbers to the wood, and on pack animals to the advanced positions. The Germans driven back by Gilder's company did not detect his withdrawal, and the trench on the crest remained empty until 1.30 next morning, when a line of men appeared on the sky-line there. Intense fire was opened on them, and the figures vanished. [V 307-308]

34th Battalion War Diary

30th March 1918

9:30am: weather wet, Battalion left CACHY and marched to BOIS LE ABBE, where they bivouaced in readiness to go forward as Counter attack troops. "B" Teams were sent to BLANGY-TRONVILLE. Battalion moved up as support Battalion to 33rd Battalion AIF who were attacking on north side of BOIS DE HANGARD and LANCERS WOOD. Battalion moved West and south of CACHY when approaching BOIS DE HANGARD advanced in Artillery formation. Battalion halted just north of BOIS DE HANGARD in position of rediness to support 33rd Battalion AIF.

6:00pm: About 6:00pm A Company 34th Battalion was detailed to go forward to report to Commanding Officer 33rd Battalion AIF who were on left flank of attack. In moving up A Company extended into 4 lines of skirmishes and laid down with cover fire from line near 33rd Battalion Headquarters. Officer Commanding A Company Captain Telford Graham Gilder went forward to reconnoitre 33rd Battalion's line. B Company 33rd Battalion was found to have suffered heavy casualties and enemy were still holding the top of ridge. It was therefore decided to attack enemy's position on ridge.

Shortly before 8:00pm A Company 34th Battalion moved forward in two waves each of two platoons. When 100 yards in rear of 33rd Battalion Head Quarters the 2nd wave inclined to the left and came up on the left of the leading wave and the whole Company attacked the ridge in one line. The enemy were driving out of what apparently was there Picquet Line where two Machine Guns were captured. The line extended its advance and drove the enemy out of his continuous line at the point of a bayonet, and advanced a further 50 yards at this point 7 prisoners were captured, 4 of whom actually went prisoners rage.

The number of enemy casualties was estimated at 60 killed and wounded. Machine Gun fire was very heavy from enemy lines on the left flank and was responsible for the death of 2nd Lieutenant Reuben PARKES a very gallant officer and most of the casualties were suffered by this company. The enemy continuous trench system was then occupied for about 2 hours. In the meantime patrols were sent out to the right flank to try to establish communication with the 33rd Battalion AIF. These patrols encountered enemy posts behind our own line on this flank. Touch was eventually gained through a patrol of the 33rd Battalion under Captain: Telford Graham GILDER. On information received from Lieutenant: 916 Robert Cecil KING That it was impossible for the 33rd Battalion to push forward on to the line which the 34th Battalion were holding, it was decided to move back to the line which the 33rd Battalion had then dug in on about 250 yards to our rear.

We then dug in our men filling a gap of about 650 yards in the 33rd Battalion line apparently the enemy did not discover our tactical withdrawal until sometime later at about 1:30 am, the enemy appeared on the sky line advancing in extended order. This apparent counter attack was completely broken up by our Machine Gun and Lewis Gun fire. About 3:00am "A" Company 34th Battalion were relieved by a Survey Regiment Company then moved to

CACHY. "B" Company 34th Battalion also occupied a position in 33rd Battalion line but did no actual fighting and had no casualties.




Figure 25 – Steamer Lancashire on which Telford Graham Gilder returned to Australia

Awards - Official Medals for Telford Graham Gilder

British War Medal 1914-20

Instituted by King George V in 1919 to mark the end of World War I and record the service given. The British War Medal 1914-20 was awarded for service in a theatre of war between 5 August 1914 and 11 November 1918.

The medal is cupro-nickel with the effigy of George V on the obverse.

The reverse has an image of St George on horseback trampling underfoot the eagle shield of the Central Powers, and a skull and cross-bones, the emblems of death. Above this is the risen sun of victory. The years 1914 and 1918 are contained on the outside edge medal.

The ribbon has a wide central watered stripe of orange, flanked by two narrow white stripes, which are in turn flanked by two black pin-stripes, further flanked by two outer stripes of blue. The colours have no particular significance.

Victory Medal

The Victory Medal was authorised in 1919 to commemorate the victory of the Allied Forces over the Central Powers. It was awarded to prescribed classes of persons who entered a theatre of war on duty between 5 August 1914 and 11 November 1918. Australians were awarded the medal issued by Great Britain.

The medal is bronze with a winged figure of Victory on the obverse..

The ribbon has a 'two rainbow' design, with the violet from each rainbow on the outside edges moving through to a central red stripe where both rainbows meet.

Military Cross

The Military Cross was instituted in December 1914 by King George V and originally intended for lower ranking Army officers (Captain or less) and Warrant Officers for 'distinguished and meritorious services'. The award carries the post-nominal MC.

Captain Telford Graham Gilder was awarded the Military Cross for an action near Passchendaele, Belgium in the *Third Battle of Ypres*.

The award was gazetted in the:

- Australia Gazette on 23 May 1918; page 1126, position 10
- London Gazette on 18 January 1918; page 959, position 10

The citation read as follows:

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty.

On 12th Octr. 1917 near PASSCHENDALE he led his Coy. forward with great coolness and bravery. When finding his left flank was open to enfilade machine gun fire he promptly made a personal reconnaissance of the open flank, and in spite of being blown up on two occasions by shells succeeded in organising a party and closing the exposed flank.

Through he showed a fine example of leadership and courage under extremely heavy fire.

Ornamental silver cross with straight arms terminating in broad finials, suspended from plain suspension bar. It is decorated with imperial crowns, with the Royal Cypher in centre.

The ribbon is 32 mm and consists of three equal vertical moiré stripes of white, purple, and white.

Cross of the European Confederation of Former Combatants

This medal was probably awarded well after the war. It is not known how Telford Graham Gilder came to acquire it, but it was probably purchased.

The Confederation of Former Combatants was recognized as of public interest by the French government on 19 April 1962 and is recognized by the Council of Europe in a consultative role. Its aim is to strengthen links between both former allies and enemies in Europe, to foster peace, security, co-operation and friendship and to defend human rights. During the height of the Cold War it acted as a point of contact between the opposing sides and was amongst the leading proponents of the Helsinki Accords. In recent years it has worked to ease the path of the former Soviet bloc countries into a united Europe.

Medal of the Royal Federation of the Veterans of King Albert I, 1948-1973

The National Federation of the Veterans of King Albert I was founded on 8 June 1948. On the occasion of its 25th anniversary in 1973 it was granted the prefix 'Royal' and the medal below was awarded to its long-serving members. In 2005 the name was changed again to the Royal Federation of Veterans and Sympathisers of King Albert I, the passage of time having thinned the ranks of surviving veterans. Combattants de la Somme 1914-1918-1940 Medal

The *Combattants de la Somme* medal is a French issued medal that any soldier of any nationality can apply for so long as they can prove that they were on active service in France between the years 1914-1918 or in 1940. The medal was created by the Ceux de la Somme, a veterans association to commemorate the battles that took place along the Somme.

The designer, Maurice Delannoy (1885-1972), was a French sculptor and medallist who was well known for his work in the art deco style. He studied at Ecole de Germain Pilon and later became a professor of drawing. He was imprisoned during World War I.




Figure 51 Telford Graham Gilder (centre?) at Gap of Dunloe, Killarney, Ireland with Captain Norman Sydney Cains (34th Battalion); autographs from reverse; Normal Cains MC, was groomsman at TG Gilders wedding (see Figure 64)






Figure 55 - AMP Chambers on right in 1960

CAUSES IN BANCO COURT.

(Before the Chief Justice, Sir Frederick Jordan, and jury.) SOLICITORS AT LAW.

Havyatt v Guder and another.

The hearing was concluded of an action in which Herry Leopold Spratt Havyatt sued two other solicitors. William Alfred Gilder and other solicitors. William Alfred Gilder and Telford Graham Gilder, father and son, under

other solicitors. William Affred Gilder and Telford Graham Colder, father and son, under an agreement said to have been made between the three of them in December, 1931.

Havyatt and the Oilders had practised as solicitors in a partnership, and it was allexed that the agreement provided that, in consideration of Havyatt withdrawing from the partnership, the defendants would assign to him their interest in a bill of costs owing to the partnership by a company called Rugenharbour Planations, Ltd. Havyatt said that he withdrew from the partnership accordingly, but that the Oilders refused to make an assignment as aliegedly agreed. He also complained that the Oilders collected £145 receivable by him by virtue of the agreement.

In his summing-up, the Chief Justice said that Havyatt was a New Zealand solicitor, and on May 31, 1929, he entered into an agreement with the Oilders, who were solicitors in New South Weles, by which it was provided that if Havyatt should himself become a solicitor in New South Wales, he should be admitted into partnership with the Gilders for five years, calculated from June 1, 1929, see the forms that he should receive £8 a

a solicitor in New South Wales, he should be admitted into partnership with the Gilders for five years, calculated from June 1, 1929, on the terms that he should receive £8 s week and a praportion of the profits of the business. Havyatt was conditionally admitted as a solicitor in New South Wales on March 31, 1931, and thereupon became a partner with the Gilders under the terms of the 1929 agreement. He was still a partner nine menths later, in December, 1931.

The Chief Justice continued: "Shortly before December 23, 1931, Havyatt had been negotiating with a New Zealand company, of which the Gilders were directors, with a view to clong work for that company, and possibly excepting a pedition with it. Havyatt says that, on a date which he fixes at December 23, 1931, he had a conversation with Gilder Junior, at which Havyatt said that he had decided to withdraw from the partnership, and as id he was willing to withdraw if he received certain salaries and drawings which he claims to have been short-paid, and also received payment of certain moneys. He says that, after discussion and consultation with the accountant, Gilder Junior acced that the short payments amounted to £96, and leans to £56, making a total of £152, and then agreed that a settlement abould be made on this basis, subject to his father's approval.

"Well, gentlemen, whatever other conclusions row come to about the case, you will probably be of the opinion that this was a piece of shorp practice in the part of Havyatt, to which one would not expect a solicitor of this Court to stoop, and conduct which would be most improper for one partner to practise on another, whether the partnership was a partnership of solicitors or not. However that may be, Havyatt unsuccessfully attempted to collect the cheque, but claimed to be entitled to do so under this alleged agreement. The Gilders, having discovered what Havyatt had done with respect to the Rugenharbour company, correspondence took place between them and Havyatt. Between December 30, 1931, and February 4, 1932, several letters were written, some of them very long, in which Havyatt exerted an agreement for dissolution and sought to justify his attempt to cash the cheque by reason of the agreeir which Havyatt andreed an agreement to dissolution and sought to justify his attempt to cash the cheque by reason of the agreement, and the Gilders asserted that although a dusolution had been proposed by Havyatt on the lines of the alleged agreement, the Gilders news agreed to this proposal either then or at any time.

Havyatt, in your opinion, has weighed down the scales by satisfying you that it was more probable than not that an agreement was entered into as he alieges.

The jury returned a vendict for Havyatt for £145.

Mr. O. E. Barwick (instructed by Mr. H. J. Bartier) appeared for plaintiff; and Mr. J. K. Emerton (instructed by Messra, Holdaworth, Summers, and Garland) for the defendants.
