MENTAL ILLNESS'

EADING Australian psychiatrists are preparing a nation-wide plan to assist the prevention and treatment of all forms of neurosis and mental sickness.

They are concerned at the ncreasing amount of "crippling nental illness" in the comnunity.

The plan—actually a longange programme—was drawn ip at the conference of the tustralasian Association of sychiatrists, which concluded in Brisbane vesterday.

One objective is the establishment of proper psychiatric clinics throughout the Commonwealth. Linked with this is the establishment of clinics for maladjusted children, staffed by psychiatrists, psychologists, social workers, and play therapists.

Educating Public

President-elect of the association (Dr. Bostock) said last night that one of the main obstacles to be overcome was public apathy towards the welfare of mental patients, and this could only be overcome by educating the public.

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Mental sicknesses could be cured if treated early and properly, he said. In the case of epilepsy, for instance, new treatment methods had changed the whole outlook, and if epileptics co-operated in treatment they could function as a normal person.

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Dr. Bostock said that although the war had undoubtedly been responsible for many neurosis cases, the war had really pinpointed the number of nervous people there were in the community.
