CORONER'S DOUBT. Insane Woman's Death.

SELF-INFLICTED BURNS.

MELBOURNE, Friday. At an inquest to-day the City Coroner (Mr. Tagata) expressed doubt whether he had been told the whole truth about an incident at the Mont Park Mental Hospital on Septem-ber 23, when a woman patient, aged 35, suffered burns from which she died three days here. days later.

suffered butns from which she died three days later. Rvidence was given that when the patient was admitted it was known that she had widdal tendencies and had threatened to set fire to her clothing. Dr. Stanley Jacob Cantor, senior medical officer at the hospital, and that early on the morning of September 10 he saw Nurses Pringle and Keating apply-all destings to a woman patient suffering from burns. In a conversation with the aures he gained the impression that they had been smoking and had left a box of matches on a chair. Neither nurse had made a direct admission. Nurse Zoe Roberta Pringle said that at 4.5 im on September 23 she relinquished charge of a dormitory. Nurse Keating relieved her. No matches had been used that night. Nurse Elsie May Keating said that when the relieved Nurse Pringe, the woman patient wit in bed. Later she heard screams and rushed to a lavatory, where she saw the woman standing enveloped in flames. She extinguished the flames with a blanket and recived slight burns herself. She rarely under the flames with a blanket and the relieved had no cigarettes or matches that night.
