Born on the 5th 7th June 1895
2nd Lieutenant 114th Battery Royal Field Artillery
25th Brigade
1st Division British Ex Force France
formerly of 113th Battery of same brigade

He was an undergraduate in second year Arts
at the time he left for England on 19th April 1915
He obtained a commission in the Special Reserve of Officers on 5th June 1915
After training at Weedon & elsewhere in England he proceeded
to the front ^{in France} & arrived at Loos in September 1915

He was mentioned in for Douglas Haig's Despatches
of the 30th April 1916 published by the War Office
on 15th June 1916 "for gallant & distinguished conduct
in the field" (near Loos)

He was again mentioned in for Douglas Haig's
Despatches of the 13th November 1916 published
by the War Office on the 2nd January 1917 for "distinguished
and gallant services and devotion to duty" in the
Somme offensive

Since promoted 1st Lieutenant during 1917
later on ^{in same year} Acting Captain & at the commencement of the
year 1918 Captain of the 114th Battery Royal Field
Artillery 25th Brigade 1st Division British Ex Force
France

Whilst Lieutenant he was wounded at Wychaete
during battle of Messines in 1917.

Mentioned for the third time in for Douglas Haig's
Despatch of the 7th April 1918 published by the
War Office 20th May 1918
