## BUSY INAUGURAL DAY FOR 450 DELEGATES

## Brilliant Gathering In University Great Hall

## SECTIONAL MEETINGS TO BEGIN TODAY

The Australasian Medical Congress which has attracted to Adelaide 450 delegates from this and the other States, as well as several distinguished oversea visitors, opened yesterday, although sectional meetings will not begin until this afternoon.

The pace set should ensure a tremendous volume of work being done before the end of the week. Starting with an exhibition of trade appliances and preparations used in medicine and surgery, delegates saw a display of doctors' hobbies, inspected the Baby Health train at the Adelaide Railway station, lunched with Masonic officers or other local hosts, attended the laying of the foundation stone of the new building for the Institute for Medical Research, attended social gatherings at the University or elsewhere in the city, and completed the day with the official opening of the congress in the Bonython Great Hall at the University last night.

The noble interior of the Great Hall was an appropriate setting for the brilliant gathering at the official opening when the hundreds of delegates attended in academic dress. Features of the gathering were the reading of a message from His Majesty the King. the address of the president of the congress (Sir Henry Newland) and the presentation to him of the gold medal of the British Medical Association (Australia).
