I am instructed by

to which you refer  
they feel justified in  
pointing out that  
there appears to them  
to be some unfairness  
in the suggestion that  
the Law Debating  
Society is responsible.  
The disturbance did  
not occur at any  
meeting of the Society.

Any law students who may have taken part in the disturbance could only have formed an exceedingly small minority of a Society which consists of 65 members.

In any case they were not acting at any meeting of the Society nor were they in any way acting as representatives of the Society.

I am also instructed to say that the Society does not anticipate that any of its members who may have taken part in

the disturbance will fail  
in their obvious duty  
to comply with the terms  
of your request,
